

Certified Nurse Aide (CNA) Training



The Certified Nurse Aide program is a 120-hour course designed to prepare students with the entry-level skills needed to work as a CNA. The course provides classroom and practical skill instruction at MCC, and clinical experience at Woodlake at Tolland, 26 Shenipsit Lake Rd., **Tolland.** Students must wear a white uniform or scrubs to all clinical sessions. The CNA provides basic patient care under the direction of nursing staff and is expected to perform the following tasks: turn and reposition bedridden patients, alone or with assistance, to prevent bedsores; answer patients' call signals; feed patients who are unable to feed themselves; observe patients' conditions; measure and record food and liquid intake and output and vital signs, and report changes to professional staff; provide patient care by supplying and emptying bed pans, applying dressings and supervising exercise routines; provide patients with help walking, exercising, and moving in and out of bed; and bathe, groom, shave, dress, and/or drape patients to prepare them for surgery, treatment or examination.

Students must attend at least 100 hours and achieve a passing grade of 70 or above to sit for the state exam. Upon completion of the course, approximately \$125 will be due when you apply to take the Connecticut State Certification Exam (not included in course fee). The instructor will inform students of test dates and procedures. - Students who have successfully completed a prior college-level course may proceed directly to the Registrar's Office. Please bring your college transcript with you.
- Students who have not successfully completed a prior collegelevel course must first take a reading comprehension test* at no cost. It will last approximately one hour. **The test will be given every Monday and Wednesday from 1-3 p.m.** (except holidays), until the class fills. No appointment is necessary. Please go to the Continuing Education Division office in the Learning Resource Center (LRC), Room B105, and ask for the Coordinator of the Credit-Free Allied Health Programs. Please bring a photo ID and your high school or GED diploma when you come to take the test.



Important Medical Information for the Following Programs:

- At least *one week prior to the start of the clinical experience*, students must provide the College with documentation of the following: a physical exam and negative PPD (Mantoux skin test for tuberculosis), both within the last 12 months; and immunizations for Rubella (German Measles); Rubeola (Regular Measles–2 doses separated by at least 30 days); Varicella Zoster (chicken pox) or a clear history; and Hepatitis B or a declination statement. A tetanus booster is recommended but not required.
- Students who do not submit the required medical documentation prior to the start of the clinical experience will not be able to continue in the program.
- * For the Pharmacy Technician program, students must have completed a college-level algebra course or must take a math comprehension test.

Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Training

This course prepares students to sit for the initial State of CT Certified EMT examination and national board certification, a primary qualification for EMT personnel. All classes are held at the Ambulance Service of Manchester, 275 New State Road, Manchester, CT. This course is helpful for police, fire department, ski patrol and other emergency personnel. The EMT is a first responder in the event of accident or illness and is expected to perform the following tasks: administer first-aid treatment and life-support care to sick or injured persons in a pre-hospital setting; assess nature and extent of illness or

injury to establish and prioritize medical procedures; maintain vehicles and medical and communication equipment, and replenish first-aid equipment and supplies; observe, record and report to the physician the patient's condition or injury, the treatment provided, and reactions to drugs and treatment; perform emergency diagnostic and treatment procedures, such as airway management during ambulance ride; operate equipment such as EKGs, external defibrillators and bag-valve mask resuscitators in advanced life-support environments; and perform procedures under a physician's direction. Students must attend at least 160 hours and achieve a passing grade of 70 or above to sit for the state exam. Upon completion of the course, approximately \$150 will be due when you apply to take the Connecticut State Certification Exam (not included in course fee). The instructor will inform students of test dates and procedures. Please note: All students MUST complete the National Incident Management System (NIMS) online training ONE week prior to the end of classes

and present the certificate to the instructor. Three modules are required, IS 100, IS 200, IS 700. Each module takes a minimum of 4-6 hours with a test at the end of each module. Students need access to a computer with email and Internet for handouts, quizzes and to complete the NIMS training. Pharmacy Technician Certification Training

The pharmacy technician prepares medications under the direction of a pharmacist and may measure, mix, count, label, and record amounts and dosages of medications. Students will learn medical terminology specific to the pharmacy, how to read and interpret prescriptions, define drugs by generic and brand names, calculate dosage and I.V. flow rates, drug compounding and dose conversion. Procedures regarding prescriptions, inventory control, billing, and insurance reimbursement will also be discussed. A pharmacy technician receives written prescription or refill requests and verifies that information is complete and accurate; maintains proper storage and security for drugs; answers telephones and responds to customer questions and requests; fills bottles with prescribed medications; types and affixes labels; assists customers; prices and files prescriptions that have been filled; cleans and helps to maintain



equipment and work areas; and sterilizes glassware according to prescribed methods. This comprehensive 60-hour course prepares students for an entry-level position in a community hospital, long-term care setting, or pharmacy and is an excellent review for the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board (PTCB) national certification exam. Please note: Anyone convicted of a felony is not permitted to sit for the exam. The course fee includes the textbook, but does not include the PTCB exam fee, nor will the exam be given at MCC; please check the PTCB web site for more exam information (www.ptcb.org). Students should bring a calculator to class.



American Heart Association Standard First Aid with AED and CPR

Required for most sports coaches, this course gives students the knowledge and skills necessary to recognize and care for breathing and cardiac emergencies, and to provide basic care for injuries and sudden illness for adults. The course includes training on the use of an automated external defibrillator (AED) for victims of sudden cardiac arrest until advanced medical personnel arrive and take over. Upon successful completion of course requirements, students will receive a certification card that includes Adult CPR & AED and Standard First Aid. A \$5 fee (checks only) will be collected by the instructor for the certification card that carries a two-year certification. Required text: American Heart Association Heartsaver First Aid with CPR & AED Workbook (ISBN 0874934788), available at MCC Bookstore, for approximately \$15.

Certification for Medical Reimbursement Specialist

The Certification for Medical Reimbursement Specialists (CMRS) is a national medical billing certificate offered in conjunction with the American Medical Billing Association (AMBA) and endorsed by the American Academy of Professional Coders (AAPC). This billing certification enhances the Certified Professional Coder (CPC) Certificate that is presently offered at MCC, enabling the student to seek greater employment opportunities. Topics include the claims-paying process in its

entirety; medical coding and terminology; insurance claims and billing procedures; appeals and denials; fraud and abuse; compliance information; web technology for medical records; reimbursement procedures; and establishing fees. The 16-module computerized exam will be administered in class toward the end of the course. The exam fee of \$255 (discounted price) includes an AMBA membership and a study guide (students must be AMBA members to take the exam). This fee is in addition to the course fee. The instructor will provide information for exam payment and membership. Students should bring a lunch to class. Watercolor Painting



Creating Mosaics

Wondering what to do with old, chipped or broken ceramics, pottery, porcelain, china, dishes, or tiles? Learn the basics of "direct method" mosaics and turn them into striking trivets. First, you will make your tesserae (the small pieces used in mosaic work) by breaking up your plates, pottery or ceramic items and laying out the pieces like a puzzle to create your own design, or you may choose from pre-designed patterns available from the instructor. Then, you will affix the pieces onto a framed Masonite tile form with mortar. In the final class, with your mortar thoroughly dried and your tesserae firmly set, you will grout your mosaic(s) and apply a felt bottom to your trivet. 
Introduction to Sign Language







Beginning with a brief history of ekphrasis, students will study and analyze ekphrastic poems, techniques, and interpretations, and then write their own ekphrastic poems inspired by paintings, sculptures, photographs or artworks of their choice. The class will be conducted as a writing workshop, focusing on the craft of poetry and on the use of metaphor and simile to reinterpret artwork. Students will be expected to share and revise their works into finished poems. The course meets every other week to allow students time to visit a museum or gallery or pursue some other art research in order to generate new ekphrastic poems. 


