

Certified Nurse Aide (CNA) Training Program

The Certified Nurse Aide Program is designed to prepare students for employment as a CNA in long-term care facilities, hospitals, clinics and home health agencies. The course includes classroom and practical skill instruction at MCC, and clinical experience at Woodlake at Tolland, 26 Shenipsit Lake Road, Tolland. A CNA provides basic patient care under the direction of nursing staff and is expected to perform tasks that include turning and repositioning bedridden patients to prevent bedsores; answering patients' call signals; assisting with daily hygiene activities and observing patients' conditions and reporting to professional staff. CNAs may also need to prep patients for surgery, treatment or examination. Students must attend at least 100 hours and achieve a passing grade of 70 or above to sit for the state exam. Approximately \$125 will be due when applying to take the Connecticut State Certification Exam (not included in course fee). The instructor will inform students of test dates and procedures. Students must wear a white uniform or scrubs to clinical. Required textbook: Basic Skills for Nursing Assistants in Long-Term Care (ISBN 9780323022040) textbook/workbook package available at MCC Bookstore for approximately \$71.

Phlebotomy Certification Training: The Art of Drawing Blood

A phlebotomist collects and prepares blood specimens for analysis. The field requires a steady hand, good vision, and manual dexterity. Students will learn about blood-collection equipment and laboratory procedures, quality assurance, universal precautions, infection control, and specimen handling, with an emphasis on pediatrics and the elderly. Students will progress from artificial arms to live volunteers. The course combines lecture with hands-on practice, including a 100-hour clinical rotation at Eastern CT Health Network (ECHN) facilities. This course requires classroom instruction and clinical training, and prepares students to sit for the American Society for Clinical Pathology Certified Phlebotomy Technician exam (\$125 fee not included in course fee). Students must complete 100 successful unaided blood draws and achieve a minimum grade of 70 on guizzes and tests. Students must wear white shoes and white clothing to the clinical site. IF YES: bring a photo ID and a copy of your transcript and proceed directly to the registrar's office to sign up.

IF NO: you must take a reading comprehension test at no cost. The test is given every Monday and Wednesday from 1-3 p.m. (except holidays), until the class fills. No appointment is necessary.

To take a comprehension test:

Go to the Continuing Education Division office in the Learning Resource Center (LRC), Room B105, and ask for the Coordinator of Credit-Free Allied Health Programs. Please bring a photo ID and your high school diploma or GED with you.

You must submit the following medical documentation prior to the start of the clinical experience or you will be unable to continue in the program.

- Tuberculosis testing chest X-ray if positive results
- Hepatitis B series (optional) or waiver signature
- Tetanus shot with past 10 years

Pharmacy Technician Certification

This comprehensive 60-hour course prepares students for an entry-level position in a community hospital, long-term care setting or pharmacy and is an excellent review for the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board (PTCB) national certification exam. The pharmacy technician prepares medications under the direction of a pharmacist. Students will learn medical terminology specific to the pharmacy, how to read and interpret prescriptions and define drugs by generic and brand names, calculate dosage and I.V. flow rates and learn about drug compounding and dose conversion. The course fee includes the textbook, but does not include the PTCB exam fee. Please check the PTCB website (www.ptcb.org) for more exam information. Students should bring a calculator to class and are requested to wear dark pants and shirt with a collar. No jeans, opentoe shoes or heels, please.

Alzheimer's and Dementia Training for Health Care Providers and Caregivers

Today, 5.4 million Americans live with dementia and Alzheimer's disease and more than half of the residents in long-term care suffer from dementia. This course is designed for healthcare workers including nurses, CNAs, home health aides and family members of people with dementia or Alzheimer's. Discussion topics will include the possible causes, onset, symptoms and stages of dementia as well as current therapies and treatments. We will also examine risk factors and methods for dealing with difficult behaviors. Understanding the disease, its diagnosis, progression, treatments, current research and resources will provide the knowledge base for compassionate care.

Veterinary Assistant I

Do you love working with animals? Veterinary assistants help with animal care in clinics, animal hospitals, zoos and animal shelters. This course will prepare students for an entry level position in veterinary and health care and this is the first part of a two-part course. Students must successfully complete part one before taking part two. Successful students will learn to obtain animal health histories, understand veterinary medical terminology, recognize signs and symptoms of illness and disease, handle and restrain small animals, exam room procedures, pharmacy and laboratory skills, facility maintenance, and front office procedures. The course is offered in partnership with Bolton Veterinary Hospital (BVH), Bolton. Prerequisite: Students must be 18 years old and have earned a high school diploma or GED. American Red Cross Standard First Aid with AED and CPR

Required for most sports coaches, this course gives students the knowledge and skills to recognize and care for breathing and cardiac emergencies, and to provide basic care for injuries and sudden illness for adults. The course includes training on the use of an automated external defibrillator (AED) for victims of sudden cardiac arrest until advanced medical personnel arrive and take over. Upon successful completion of course, students will receive certification in both Adult CPR/AED and Standard First Aid. A \$27 fee (checks only) will be collected by the instructor for the Adult CPR card (two-year certification) and Standard First Aid card (three-year certification). Required text: First Aid/CPR/AED Participant's Manual, (ISBN 9781584804796), available at MCC Bookstore for approximately \$10.50.

Babysitting Safety: CPR and First Aid for Young Caregivers

This course is designed for young caregivers, ages 10 and up. Guidelines and standards of the American Heart Association are followed during CPR and Choking and Basic First Aid demonstrations and skill practice. Mannequins are used for hands-on practice. These basic CPR skills are the same that are used for adults, children and infants. Basic information on caregiver responsibilities and how to care, handle, feed and change infants and children are all discussed, demonstrated and practiced. Police and fire safety topics, including an overview of the 911 system and when to access it in an emergency, are also discussed. Students should bring a lunch. Basic Life Support for Healthcare Professionals: Includes CPR and AED

This course is appropriate for CNAs, EMTs, nursing students, paramedics, police officers and fire fighters as well as school, fitness center, hotel and restaurant employees. It meets the requirements of The American Heart Association Basic Life Support (BLS) for Healthcare Providers and The American Red Cross CPR/AED for the Professional Rescuer. Healthcare professionals will learn to recognize life-threatening emergencies and provide CPR, use an AED, and relieve choking in a safe, timely and effective manner. Students will complete an instructorled training session, skills practice and certification exam. The American Heart Association Certification card is \$6 extra and payable to the instructor with either a bank check or cash. No personal checks, please. Students should bring a lunch. Required text: Basic Life Support for Healthcare Providers (ISBN 9781616690397) for \$20, and one pocket for mask \$9, available at MCC Bookstore. Whether for fun or profit, for gifts or for yourself, this course will educate you—the shopper—in how to spot and pick antiques and collectibles at flea markets, estate sales, tag and yard sales, and estate and storage auctions. Learn how to evaluate and appraise items; discover bargains among antiques and collectibles; haggle with vendors; understand marketplace trends; and identify commonly found tag sale treasures: sterling silver vs. plated silver, paintings vs. prints, collectible glassware vs. ordinary, originals vs. reproductions, vintage toys vs. modern toys. In the last session, students may bring in items for an evaluation or appraisal. Interior Design Basics

Whether you are interested in interior design as a career option or a hobby, this course will help you refine your creative abilities to produce cohesive designs. We will cover the essential steps of the design process and produce drawings that clearly express your design vision. The following skills will be covered: concept development, form, function, hierarchy, scale, balance, and rhythm, as well as design elements such as furniture, materials, textile, lighting, and sustainability. This instructional and studio-based course will culminate with each student presenting a design concept for a small space, including drawings and materials board. A supply list will be sent before the start of class. Materials fee: approximately \$20.

The Art of Architectural Drawing
Using the example of a small, residential design project, learn both freehand and hard-line drawing techniques, beginning with basic drawing conventions, such as plan, section, elevation, and 3-D modeling (and including how an architect plans and designs such a project) and finishing with a demonstration of how to assemble a drawing presentation. On the last session, the instructor will give a final critique of students' drawings. Emphasis will be placed on acquiring familiarity with architectural drawing scales, line drawing techniques, and the presentation of projects. Learn how to collect imagery, prepare canvases, use matte and acrylic mediums, and layer imagery, as well as oil glaze techniques, and then how to incorporate collaged imagery into your oil paintings. Please bring the following supplies to class: two small canvases or canvas pad, gesso, oil paints, brushes, acrylics, scissors or blade, and assorted magazines or other collage materials from home.

Practice control with the brush, mixing paint and water, and creating a foundation tone to build upon with a full spectrum of colors. Introduction to Oil Pastels

Learn how to use oil pastel and master the flexibility of the wonderful medium in its various possibilities. The instructor will demonstrate technique, and will work individually with each student to help you achieve your artistic goals. In addition to learning how to work with the medium, we will learn how blend and layer colors, and achieve harmony in art. Students should bring to class a Bristol pad (approximately 14" x 12") and an oil pastel set, plus an extra white and black pastel. Don't be a Gluten!

Many of us are on special diets to keep our stomachs healthy, but the choices make it difficult to find baked goods to enjoy. Most of these choices in stores are plain tasting and others are expensive. If your diet requires glutenfree foods, then gluten-free, all-purpose mixes are available and can be turned into breads and desserts that will please the palate and the wallet. The FODMAP diet permits the use of spelt (triticum spelta), the predecessor of wheat (triticum sativum), with a flavor similar to wheat, and some dieters find this gluten easier



to digest. Bags of spelt in white and whole grain are more common than you may imagine. We will bake a variety of treats, including quick bread; sponge yeast bread (gluten-free, dairy-free, and egg-free), which is lighter than air muffins; rich chocolate-zucchini cake; Farinata (chick pea flour skillet bread); and polenta pizza. Some will satisfy the glutenfree requirement and others the FODMAP diet. Students should bring a medium-sized bowl, two cotton dish towels, and a sponge. Refund Policy for Credit-Free Courses


