BRIDGES TO HEALTH CAREERS SCHOLARSHIPS

Through the "Bridges to Health Careers Scholarships" from the U.S. Department of Labor [USDOL Grant # CB-15923-07-60-A-9], MCC's Division of Continuing Education is able to award partial scholarships to eligible students for the following Allied Health programs:

- Certified Nurse Aide (CNA) Training
- Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Training
- · Pharmacy Technician Certification Training

These scholarships are on a first-come, first-serve basis, with a limited number of scholarships awarded per program. Please be sure to ask about the scholarship when registering for these programs.

Pharmacy Technician Certification Training

This comprehensive, 60-hour course will prepare students for entrylevel positions in community, hospital and long-term care settings, and for the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board (PTCB) exam in order to receive national certification (exam not included). Topics will include medical terminology specific to the pharmacy, reading and interpreting prescriptions, and defining drugs by generic and brand names. Students will learn dosage calculation, I.V. flow rate, drug compounding, and dose conversion. Dispensing of prescriptions, inventory control, billing, and insurance reimbursement will also be discussed. Please bring a calculator to class. Approximately three to six hours of clinical experience outside the course is mandatory and will be coordinated with the student. The course fee includes the textbook, but does not include the PTCB exam fee, nor will the exam be given at MCC; please check the PTCB web site for more exam information (www.ptcb.org). Please note: Proof of high school diploma or GED is required to sit for the PTCB exam, but this proof is not necessary to take the course. In addition, anyone convicted of a felony is not permitted to sit for the exam. Prerequisite: A fluency in mathematics through algebra is required to complete necessary pharmaceutical calculations. Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Training

This course prepares students for the Connecticut State-certified EMT examination and provides them with entry-level skills needed to work as an EMT. The course is also useful for members of police and fire departments and other emergency personnel. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age or have a waiver signed by a parent/guardian prior to acceptance in the program. Students must attend at least 130 hours, achieve a course score of 70 or above, and be recommended by the instructor to sit for the State exam. Students will schedule 10 additional hours to ride with an ambulance crew. All classes meet at South Windsor Ambulance Corp., 151 Sand Hill Road, South Windsor. Required textbook: AAOS (American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons, 9th Edition, available from instructor for approximately \$80.

Certified Nurse-Aide (CNA) Training

The Certified Nurse-Aide Training program is designed to prepare students with entry-level skills needed to work as a CNA. The program provides classroom and practical skill instruction at MCC, and clinical experience at a nursing facility to be announced. A recent physical exam and TB test are required. Students must attend at least 100 hours and achieve a passing grade of 70 or above to sit for the State exam. Required textbook: Basic Skills for Nursing Assistants in Long-Term Care, Sorrentino, available at MCC Bookstore for approximately \$70.

American Red Cross Standard First Aid with AED and CPR

The purpose of this course is to give students the knowledge and skills necessary to recognize and care for breathing and cardiac emergencies, and to provide basic care for injuries and sudden illness for adults. The course includes training on the use of an automated external defibrillator (AED) for victims of sudden cardiac arrest until advanced medical personnel arrive and take over. Upon successful completion of course requirements, students will receive certification in both Adult CPR/AED and Standard First Aid. The Artist and Technology: Create Your Own Online Portfolio



Do you have a keen visual sense but need to learn the skills that will allow you to capture your visions in a painting? Or perhaps you're a skilled artist who needs a little more information to give your work that special polish. Participants will work with traditional oil paints, acrylics, or the newer water-mixable oil paints. Each student will receive individual instruction in his or her medium of choice. Beginning students will learn some fundamentals of painting, including basic composition and color theory, while more advanced students will be encouraged to develop personal imagery. Students will choose their subjects—still life, abstraction, landscape, figure, or others. Drawing Fundamentals and Beyond

Students will learn to view things the way the old masters did—with an emphasis on a given light source and how it enables the artist to develop three-dimensional form. Students will also learn from instructor demonstrations and class critiques. Students will start with charcoal drawings of simple shapes, and then build upon one's faculty of observation, working toward more complex statements, usually of an organic nature. The primary concern throughout the course will be on composition, as well as the use of varied values in defining three-dimensional form. Handouts on color theory will also be provided and applied to the use of pastels and drawing still-life subjects. Precious Metal Clay for Beginners: Creating Silver Jewelry

Craft fine silver jewelry as though you're playing with clay. No prior artistic or metals experience necessary. Create at your own pace with this exciting new material that combines the pliability of clay with the elegance and permanence of precious metal. The course will teach you the following skills: how to form a jewelry object by rolling, cutting, molding and stamping precious metal clay (PMC+); stone setting to create a piece with gems; mold making and texturing shortcuts; and finishing and antiquing your jewelry choices, such as pendants, earrings, charms, bracelet elements, and simple beads. Materials fee, payable to instructor at class: \$68.50 for one package of PMC+; use of the kiln and tools; molding, finishing, and polishing supplies; two small gemstones; and appropriate findings. Additional PMC+ and stones will be available for purchase if desired. Price adjustments may be necessary based on the market price of silver and PMC. A materials list will be mailed prior to class.

You'll even get a chance to trying stone carving yourself! The second class will meet at Green Cemetery in Glastonbury, home of the "Glastonbury Lady" and numerous poignant epitaphs. Adding Brick and Stone to Your Garden





Real Estate and Appraisal Commissions Licensure Information

All of the real estate courses offered at MCC for licensure and continuing education are recognized by the Real Estate Consortium of Community Colleges of Connecticut and have been approved and filed with the State of Connecticut Real Estate Commission. Both the film and the memoir raise interesting questions about colonialism and the accuracy of memory in depicting post-traumatic events. The first class will discuss the book.
