They will examine exemplar models for craft and structure and apply those conventions in their own writing.

In College Writing, students are beginning to read Gabriel Garcia Marquez's One Hundred Years of Solitude as they explore the rich history of Latin American Literature and Magical Realism. In CPWL, students are planning, writing and editing their college essays to prepare for application season, which is just around the corner!

Ms. Sullivan's Classes

My American Literature Honors class is time traveling into the 1700's to see what early America was really like. From reading

texts such as What is an American?, The Declaration of Independence, and more! My English II Honors class is students are now getting ready to read Lord of the Flies by William Golding. Students will continue to explore the idea of individuality and conformity throughout the text., the world, and other texts in the process. My English II class has been exploring the idea of identity and conformity. Students will read Night by Elie Weisel. They will explore the idea of leaving a legacy and the importance of the decisions they make in this world.

All science students began the school year by reviewing and learning specific safety procedures and protocols for our science labs. Biology students will then delve into the first unit on sustainability. This unit teaches the foundational exploratory procedures and language that we will utilize throughout the curriculum. Madyson Carroll, the editor of the school newspaper, is a sophomore at Great Path Academy and is currently taking English Composition at Manchester Community College.


