## Aurora grant will help female former inmates attend MCC

MANCHESTER — Women being released from prison in Connecticut have a new educational resource with the creation of a pilot program connected to Manchester Community College.

The Aurora Foundation, which supports women and girls in the Greater Hartford area, awarded a \$20,000 grant to launch the "Free to Succeed" pilot program.

"Free to Succeed" is focused on recently released prisoners who hold high school diplomas or the equivalent and are looking to pursue higher education at the community college level, Michael Jordan-Reilly, MCC's director of public relations, said.

MCC will provide support services and mentoring to the women, helping them become enrolled in associate degree programs much faster.

The women can also pursue their education at Capital Community College in Hartford, which is part of a larger consortium that was awarded the grant.

Trinity College, which provides education for inmates while they're serving their sentences, is another partner in the consortium. It's joined by Community Partners in Action, an organization dedicated to providing resources for people affected by the criminal justice system, and the Judy Dworin Performance project, an organization of professional artists who use arts to catalyze social change.

Veronica DeLandro, the Aurora Foundation's incoming executive director, said the program's collaborative efforts give "Free to Succeed" a larger overall impact.

The new program reflects "the core of our mission," Jordan-Reilly said, as "Free to Succeed" supports people who need opportunities to pursue higher education and whose lives can benefit from it.

The school is pleased to be able

to support a population that can benefit from educational support, Jordan-Reilly said.

The program also helps provide new inroads for former prisoners to achieve success, including from the CONNNTAC Educational Opportunity Center, which provides free educational counseling and career planning services to Connecticut students.

"Participants will attend workshops and receive one-on-one counseling," said Ivette Rivera-Dreyer, MCC's director of financial aid, in a statement. "They may also quality for small grants to cover bus passes for reliable transportation to campus and work-study to cover other expenses.

"The need to increase education in prisons is especially acute for women," said Rivera-Dreyer. "Statistics show that the inmates who participated in correctional education programs are 43 percent less likely to return to prison than inmates who did not.'

At MCC, the school's Sister-2-Sister mentoring program will provide support to the women from other students. This will help them to relate and acclimate to the college experience.

So far, Jordan-Reilly said, one student is enrolled in the program for the fall, and "Free to Succeed" will only grow from there.

While the initial grant is small, it's a "seed for what could be a an important part of our programs going forward," Jordan-Reilly said. He hopes "Free To Succeed" will draw additional students and grow in the near future.

"We are pleased to be part of this effort to reach out to a group that has traditionally been left behind," said Dr. Gena Glickman, the president of MCC, in a statement.

"The 'Free to Succeed' program is a valuable opportunity for us to help provide an education that will give these women a chance to improve their lives and make positive contributions to our communities.'
